## ART FAIR\ HOUSE TOUR '74

The 7th Annual Skinker-DeBaliviere Art Fair and House Tour will be held on Mothers Day, May 12, 1974, from 12 until 5 p.m. on the 6100 block of Kingsbury. As in previous years the street will be closed to traffic during those hours, when it becomes a promenade featuring approximately 100 artists and their work. Cash prizes will be awarded in various categories. Judging the art work will be Dennis Johnson and David Eisler, who are neighbors and faculty members at Washington University.

Also as in the past there will be a House Tour for which tickets can be purchased at a booth at the Art Fair and at each house on the tour. Bus transportation for those taking the tour will be provided free of charge courtesy of Washington University.

### Clinic Sponsors Neighborhood Project

The People's Clinic is now coordinating a Trash Can Holder project as one of the first steps in getting and maintaining clean alleys and backyards. It is our hope to supply as many residents as possible in the Skinker-DeBaliviere area with a rack which will sturdily support the resident's trash containers against dogs, children, weather, or whatever.

At the end of January, we met with several area people to look at some preliminary designs and two prototypes the clinic has assembled.

Labor will be by volunteers from the blocks that are building the racks and from the People's Clinic.

Sam Green, President of the Block Association of the 60 and 6100 blocks of Westminster, and William Bolden, President of the Block Association of the 5800 block of DeGiverville, are shown in the photo examining one of the trash can holders that will be distributed in Bolden's block. Sam and William are just two of the many block presidents and other

We also discussed how we could fund the project and get needed people power and materials. Block chairmen who were present returned to canvass their blocks to see what their actual needs were so that we could begin with these as pilot projects.

The group decided, at least at first, to try to get residents who want a trash can holder to pay for the costs of the materials, an amount which comes to about five dollars for a two can holder and six-fifty for a three can holder.

The Clinic plans to work with neighborhood groups to get them started on their own trash can project. To assist these groups, a manual with instructions, blue prints, and cost estimates of material is to be developed by the Clinic.

Other features of Art Fair Weekend include a children's display of art work, and several fund raising events for the benefit of neighborhood philanthropic and civic groups. (See "Art Fair Weekend Events" below, and stories within.)

## WHN NEWS

There was a surprise visitor at the second WHN meeting on housing--Mayor Poelker! He praised the work of panelist Joe Clark and commended the goals of neighborhood organization like ours. "We are as concerned about the number of continuances as you are," promised Mr. Joe Clark, Director of St. Louis Board of Public Safety, at the WHN General Meeting April 18th. He disclosed the fact that he, Mayor Poelker, Mr. Collins, Clerk of the City Court, and Judge Rosenthal, Housing Court Judge, had been regularly meeting to discuss these continuances, as many as seventeen in one case, which occur in court after his Building Division has completed its inspection process. "An exhaustive search for owners" is being launched to find "absentee landlords with a capital A," explained Mr. Clark. He encouraged residents to jot down the names of owners for reference and rental manager company names from signs in case these people have "started to hide" when violations are written against their buildings." Filing complaints and reporting violations are also citizen outlets for concern, he added.

## RNA EXEC. COMMITTEE REPORT

An April 18th meeting of the Rosedale Neighborhood Association Executive Comm. resulted in a \$1600 budget for the 1974-75 fiscal year. The budget was established to reflect the goals of the organization which the committee feels are essential to the growth and well-being of the neighborhood.

Items in the budget include contributions to the Paper and the Clinic. Monies are provided for trash clean up and alley maintenance as well as planting of trees. RNA has been asked to contribute toward replacement of a movie projector stolen from the library earlier this year. Payment of a debt to the Skinker-DeBali-viere Community Council is included in the budget as well as a modest amount for operating expenses.

6140 McPherson



## Caring is what counts.

Her uniform: jeans and a plaid shirt. Her tools: pencil and paper. Her credentials: kind eyes and a smile that says, "Can I help you?"

Karen Platt is no ordinary doctor's assistant. She is one of the many neighborhood people who give their time and energy to the Loop West End People's Clinic.

Her official title is intake counselor, and she is the second person you would meet (not including the other patients) at the clinic, right between the greeter at the desk as you walk in and the doctor.

If you were one of the hundreds of visitors to visit the clinic during the last few months, you may have already met Karen. That is, if you came in on a Thursday night, for that is the night she shares a shift with four or five other volunteers.

"My job as intake counselor involves besides asking the usual questions of name and age, inquiring how the patient found out about the clinic, and finding out just what is bothering him. It's also important for the best treatment, to have some background or history of the physical ailment."

In case anyone needs additional help, Karen explains the various informational booklets that the clinic distributes, or refers the patient to further counseling for his or her specific needs.

The clinic's main concern, Karen feels, is with delivering simple medical attention and advice. For instance, she tells all new incoming women patients about the necessity of having annual pap smear tests to detect early cervical cancer and the importance of pre-natal care.

Karen talks to the patients both before and after they see a doctor. Afterwards she checks to make sure they have no unanswered questions.

She finds that people come into the clinic after they have had unpleasant experiences with hospital clinics or their regular doctor and that they are generally pleased with the way they were treated at the clinic.

Outside the clinic 24 year old Karen works a full day teaching remedial math and science to 50 grade school children in the Wellston School District.

She is very excited about a recently acquired second job which involves a special method of teaching remedial reading to kids with difficulties.

She said that if this method proves effective it can be extended into the home; parents and brothers and sisters can all take part.

Everyone taking part--that is Karen's ideal.

Even though there is a doctor in the family, she came to the clinic not so much concerned with medical learning as with the people--kids, parents, all age groups.

"I wanted to get involved in a small community such as Skinker-DeBaliviere because I feel that if communities are active they can have a big effect on people."

"At the Loop West End People's Clinic they share my philosophy. They believe in free medical care and helping people to help themselves."






